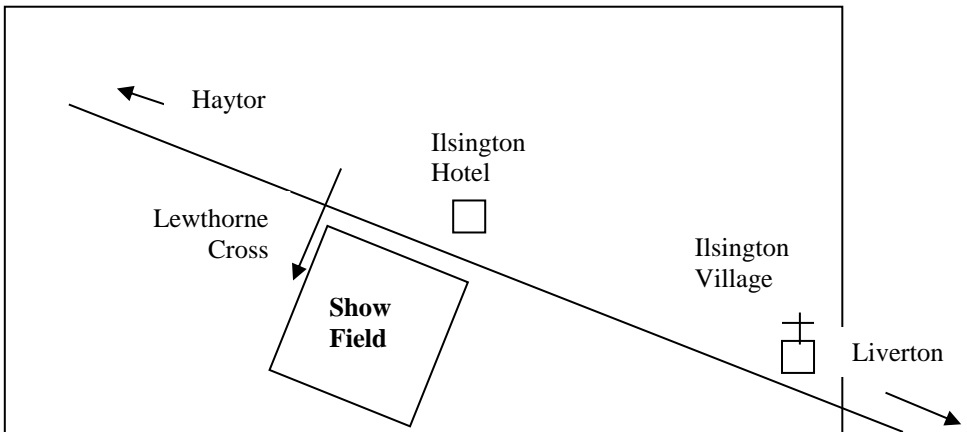

Points and Prizes

The entry fee for all sections except Section VII is 20p for each entry (Please see Rule 12). All rules will be strictly enforced and the Show Secretary is forbidden to accept late entries. Exhibitors willing to donate Exhibits for the benefit of the Show, please notify the Show Secretary. Exhibits which are not for competition will be gladly accepted, but the Show Secretary would like to receive notice beforehand, in order to reserve space. Exhibitors are requested not to remove Exhibits before the presentation of prizes.

In Class 42 the number of points awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd will be 6, 4 and 2. In ALL OTHER CLASSES the number of points for 1st, 2nd and 3rd will be 3, 2 and 1. In the event of a tie with the highest number of points in a section, the Exhibitor with the highest number of 1st prizes will be declared the winner. **Please note: there will be no prize money for adults' classes.**

Hints for New Exhibitors

We are keen to encourage new exhibitors in the Show, and offer some simple hints which may be of help. Have a go - participating is great fun!

Cut flowers – all flowers should be in water in the exhibitor's own container. Leaves on the stems should be removed below water level.

Pot plants – a saucer under the pot prevents unsightly marking on the tables. Large-leafed plants look better when sponged. A clean pot improves the presentation.

Potatoes – should be gently washed and as near uniform in size as possible.

Onions and shallots - trim leaves to about 6-7 cm, bend in half and secure with twine or elastic bands. Cut off roots and wash gently, ensuring that you do not remove any of the outer skin. Shallots should be exhibited on a plate of sand or sawdust.

Runner beans – should be crisp, straight and of similar size. Beans should be shown with a piece of stalk attached. Wrap them in a damp tea towel overnight to keep them straight.

Mange tout and Sugar Snap peas - mange tout pods should be flat with seeds present but undeveloped, whereas snap pea pods should be fleshy and snap easily. Specimens should be fresh and of good colour, with blooms intact and free from disease and pest damage.

Beetroot and carrots – should be gently washed. The tap root should be left undamaged, but the foliage should be removed to 5-8 cm.

Lettuce – the root should be removed to enable the lettuce to stand on its base.

Tomatoes – should have the calyx still attached and be as near uniform in size as possible.

Collection of Vegetables (Class 42) – to consist of only those kinds listed in Classes 23 – 41, 43, 44 and 46 – 52 and to be the same number of each kind as in those classes. Parsley may be used for decoration.

Soft fruit - usually exhibited on a plate of leaves of the same variety.

Cakes - should be shown on paper plates with doilies, not on china or other plates.

Jams and chutney jars should not have metal caps

In all classes, ensure that you enter the correct number of items as specified in the schedule.

Plant swap stall /Bring and Buy

Are you coming to the Ilstington Parish Summer Show? If you are then don't forget to bring a plant to the 'Swap Stall'. You can either swap plants or buy all sorts of flowering, herb and vegetable plants. Seedlings to saplings will be awaiting a new garden.

Family dog show

Why not bring your dog along and enter the Family Dog Show. Starting at 2.30 pm on the afternoon of the show.

Please note: the judge's decision is final.

Plant material for CLASSES 16 to 22 need not have been grown by the Exhibitor. **An exhibit** is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as defined in the Show Schedule. Natural plant material includes fresh and/or dried flowers and foliage, fruit, vegetables, cane, driftwood, etc. **No artificial plant material.** **An arrangement** consists only of natural material. A **novice** is someone who has not previously won two First Prizes for Flower Arrangement at any Show.
No niches will be supplied.

Ages are based on the September after the show to ensure that children entered by the Schools and individually are grouped correctly. Age **must** be shown on all entries. All entries must be the competitor's own unaided work. All exhibits can be collected at 4.30 pm on the day of the show. Prize money (for children's classes only) is as follows: 1st £1; 2nd 75p; 3rd 50p.

Rules

1. All trophies are perpetual and the property of the Ilstington Parish Summer Show and are returnable on demand of the Committee.
2. The decision of the Committee in the classification of any Exhibit or any matter pertaining to these Rules is final.
3. Where the Schedule indicates the varieties or quantities required, any exhibit with more or less than the stated will be disqualified.
4. Where the Judges consider there is not sufficient merit shown, any one or all of the Prizes offered for the competition may be withheld.
5. No more than one exhibit of the same kind will be accepted from any Exhibitor except they be entered in different Classes.
6. All exhibits must be the property of the Exhibitor, and have been grown in his/her possession for two months at least, and Cut Flowers, Fruit and Vegetables grown in his/her garden. Anyone exhibiting that which has not been grown in his/her garden will be disqualified in all exhibits in the current Show. Sections II, III and Classes 13&14 and 94 – 102 are excluded from these conditions.
7. No articles in Sections V, VI, VII, VIII and IX may previously have been exhibited at any Ilstington Show.
8. Exhibits in Sections II and III will be judged according to the NAFAS Handbook of Schedule Definitions, 9th edition, 1996. The Show Secretary has a copy.
9. All exhibits must be in place between 7.30 am and 9.45 am on the morning of the Show. Only officials are allowed on the premises during the judging.
10. Labels on Needlework, Knitting and Crochet must be pinned on, and labels must be attached to preserve jars.
11. Entry forms must be completed and returned by all exhibitors, including school children, by the Tuesday before the Show, to any of the names listed on the Forms. Entry Fees to be paid at the same time.
12. All exhibits are accepted on the understanding that the exhibitor agrees to abide by these Rules.
13. Anyone violating or helping others to violate any of these Rules will be penalised according to the discretion of the Committee.
14. The committee accept no responsibility or liability for the exhibits.
